Gretchen Aylsworth EENP Board member 2008-2017, 2018-2023

Gretchen was on Team EENP from the very beginning. When we called her just a month or so after forming the organization and asked her if she would be the board chair for this pie in the sky nonprofit we were starting, Gretchen laughed and said yes without hesitating.

She was a string of "first" and "most" for EENP. While taking on "first board chair" she became one of our first group of Puppy Parents, raising EENP's third dog, Ayla -- the first of many she had a hand in training.

She became our first recruiter, reaching out and bringing in board members, development committee members, donors, and volunteers. In connecting EENP with our community she is certainly the "most". It will be many years before anyone else can claim the title of "recruited the most board members" because Gretchen has it by a mile right now.

Gretchen was our first board member to term out, and she returned eagerly after a mandatory year off the board.

Gretchen was a diehard supporter of EENP and its mission in more ways than we can possibly share here. It was a shock to lose her in January. We'll never be able to replace her, nor do we want to. She leaves a big hole and will be missed dearly. *Thank you, Gretchen, for 15 years of service and connection.*



About EENP

Eyes Ears Nose and Paws partners people with dogs to improve lives.

We are a Hillsborough nonprofit that trains and places assistance dogs with people with disabilities. Our mobility service dog program trains and partners dogs with individuals with mobility impairments. These dogs assist with a wide variety of daily tasks, including retrieving dropped items, opening doors, and helping prevent and recover from falls.

The medical alert dog program provides dogs which are trained to detect and alert their human companions to changes in medical condition, to retrieve medical kits, and to seek outside assistance if necessary. Most of the dogs placed in this program are diabetic or seizure alert dogs.

Many of our puppies start their journey in the homes of our breeder caretakers, where a volunteer team nurtures our pups through their first eight weeks.

From there, our puppies move into the care of young puppy trainers, community volunteers who raise them until they are 6-8 months old. Young puppy trainers give EENP pups a strong foundation for their training as assistance dogs.

When pups are 6-8 months old, they move into prison where they are trained by the ABEL trainers, who do the bulk of the training of EENP's assistance dogs. The dogs rotate out of prison on furlough for one week a month for socialization and training in public and home settings. You can read more about ABEL on the reverse of this page.

When the dogs are ready for placement, our clients go through an intense two-week Client Training Seminar where they are matched with their assistance dogs. Graduation celebrates these new partnerships and the end of the long training journey. Thank you for joining us today to celebrate them!

AT BOTH ENDS OF THE LEASH

We believe learning and service can happen *at both ends of the leash*, so we started a partnership with the correctional system where we teach incarcerated men to train our assistance dogs. The dogs receive full-time attention, training, and love, and the trainers are able to develop interpersonal, leadership, and job skills while giving back to the community despite their incarceration.

In the At Both Ends of the Leash (ABEL) program, dogs live in prison and are with their handlers 24 hours a day. ABEL trainers are not only taught how to train their dogs but are also coached in interpersonal and job skills including communication, planning, and leadership skills.

The newest phase of ABEL bridges the gap between our two medium security programs and work release with a minimum security program for trainers promoted out of the medium security program. This allows interested trainers to stay continuously engaged in the ABEL program from five or more years before release all the way through their release from prison.

The ABEL work release program further prepares ABEL trainers for reentry into our community once they complete their prison sentences. ABEL trainers qualify for work release by excelling as instructors while working in the ABEL program inside prison and meeting all the criteria required by the prison administration. They are hired as EENP employees and are able to save their wages for living expenses when they are released from prison.

Once hired, ABEL work release trainers are allowed to leave prison to work at the EENP office during the business day. They train EENP pups in public settings to prepare them for placement and lead classes with our volunteers and clients.
